As a result, all members are invited to attend and provide their input. The Temple Board can then make decisions in accordance with the congregation's desires.



Letter from Rabbi Tami Elliott

Shalom Chaverim (Friends),

After weeks filled with many Jewish holidays during which we celebrated in our Sukkot (festival booths), ate our new sweet fruit for the New Year and rolled our Torahs back to the beginning to read them again (because we are not the same people we were last year), we start a new year refreshed by the beautiful colors of the fall and the limitless possibilities which await us during the coming year.

So as I pondered about what to write about, I remembered that November is one of those rare months in which there are no special Jewish holidays other than Shabbat (which of course is special in and of itself)! I then remembered one of my teachers in Jerusalem, Rabbi Shaul Feinberg, one of the kindest and welcoming persons whom I had ever met. In our liturgy class, we each had to present some sort of reading or poem which had a special meaning for us. I chose a poem, which is in our new prayer book, Mishkan Tefillah, which was written by a Leah Goldberg, an Israeli poet, and wanted to share that with you.

Leah Goldberg was born in Prussia in 1911. She studied in Lithuania and Germany and received her doctorate from the University of Bonn in 1933. She moved to Palestine in 1935 and became a lecturer in literature at Hebrew University in Jerusalem, a theatre critic and a prominent poet and author, writing many volumes of poetry and over 20 children's books. In 1970, the year that she died, she was awarded the Israel Prize for

Literature. My favorite poem of hers is called, <u>Lamdeinu Elohai</u>, "Teach Me O God. . ."

Teach me O God, a blessing, a prayer On the mystery of a withered leaf On ripened fruit so fair On the freedom to see, to sense, To breathe, to know, to hope, to despair

Teach me O God, a blessing, a hymn of praise As each morning and night You renew Your days, Lest my days be as the one before Lest routine set my ways

We are given new opportunities every hour and every minute to make the most of every moment. The possibilities are endless and the reward is great, if we only reach for it. This is the potential for living our Jewish lives to the fullest.

Take a few moments to make a difference for the men and women who struggle in Darfur, for the 47 million who do not have healthcare in this country, to encourage the EPA to fulfill its mandate to keep our air and water clean. Growing Jewish Families Update



Plans are currently underway for all three threads of our Temple's Growing Jewish Families Program. Future newsletters will include details regarding the two threads for tweens/teens and women, but for now . . .

Please mark your calendars for the first scheduled program for families with young children (tot thread). This gathering is geared to families with children five and under who would like to start, or enhance, their family shabbat traditions. Hence the name Tot Shabbat! On her next Temple visit, November 14, Rabbi Tami will help facilitate an evening of fun and worship. Please join us at 5:15 p.m. for a light snack and activity with the Shema prayer as the theme.

Each young child will be able to decorate, (with fabric markers) a Shema and Sweet Dreams pillowcase. (Please bring an old work shirt or other clothing acceptable for messy work.) Each child will take home a Shema and Sweet Dreams activity book, which will give parents the opportunity to teach their children the Shema at bedtime in an interactive and gentle way. Also, each family will be given a Shema and Sweet Dreams CD and songbook complete with 20 songs created by the Jewish Family Education Project of Metro Detroit's Cantors and Cantorial Soloists.

Following the activity, Rabbi Tami will officiate a Tot Shabbat service and then help host a simple meal. The meal will be provided by the Sisterhood and is scheduled just before the evening adult/family service at 7 p.m. So we will be fitting a lot between 5:15 and 7 p.m.!

As coordinator, I encourage you join us. I will be making calls earlier in the week to remind families with young children of this exciting gathering—only the first of many to come!

Our sympathy is extended to TBI members Edward "Mike" McNamra and Kay Erlanger-McNamara on the death of Mike's father, Edward G McNamara, Jr., who passed away October 11, 2008.

Born in 1916, Mr. McNamara lived in St. Ignace for most of his life. He served in the military during World War II, graduated from University of Detroit in 1948, and was an attorney in Michigan, following in the footsteps of both his father and grand-father, and in 1949 was appointed by then Governor G. Mennen Williams as Mackinac County's Friend of the Court and served for 42 years until resignation in 1990. He was involved in scouting, enjoyed woodworking and remodeling his home. He will be greatly missed by his community. A contribution in his memory has been given to the Meyerson Perpetual Kaddish Fund by the B'nai Israel Sisterhood.
