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Rabbi's Corner

In the second week of January, our community was saddened by events surrounding two Jewish figures, Debbie Friedman and U.S. Rep. Gabrielle Giffords.

Debbie Freidman was born in Utica New York and raised in Minnesota. Her musical and liturgical talent became apparent at a young age at OSRUI camp, the first Reform summer camp. As we all know, she went on to become one of the most influential

Jewish musicians of the twentieth century. Her loss on to pneumonia was sudden and tragic.

Gabrielle Giffords was born in Tucson Arizona to a Jewish father and Christian-Science mother. Since 2001, she has identified as Jewish. She is a member of Congregation Chaverim, a Reform Congregation, in Tucson. After a noteworthy term in the Arizona congress, she rose to become Arizona's first Jewish U.S. Congresswoman. On January 8, she was shot, along with nineteen others, while meeting congregants at a local Safeway. As of this article's writing, six of those people have died. Although Gabrielle Giffords appears to be recovering, her condition remains serious.

We are saddened by Debbie's loss, but we are shocked by Rep. Gifford's. The alleged shooter, Jared Lee Loughner, espoused belief in the "Zionist Occupation Government" conspiracy theory. This conspiracy theory argues that the U.S. Government is taking orders from the Israeli government. It is virulently anti-Semitic and plays a role in various militant groups west of the Mississippi. Basically, it identifies Jews as the antichrist and says that we must be killed for the messiah to appear.

A Note from Rabbi Daniel J. Fellman on the Events in Tucson, AZ.

We have all been pained by the events in Tucson, AZ this past month. As Americans, acts of violence against citizens gathered to discuss issues of the day leave us wondering what happened to the clause in the First Amendment about the right to peaceful gatherings. And as Jews, this act of violence provides a stark reminder of the perils faced by any society.

Over the last couple of years, rhetoric has sunk lower and lower, as too many have vilified those with whom they do not agree. Our society seems to have forgotten the difference between opponents and enemies. Those with whom we disagree on a particular issue or set of issues are not our enemies – we do not wish them harm. Rather, we see them as adversaries. We view those with whom we may hold even the deepest of disagreements as the opposition, but never threats to our very existence.

Ours is a nation built on the freedom to disagree. We Americans gave the world the unique gift of a representative democracy where all are free to support or oppose a policy without threat of retribution. That gift has languished of late, and today we live in a world where the other side is no longer a respected rival but now viewed as evil, one to be destroyed.

In the new reality of hate-language and flaring tempers, bashing of one's adversary has become not just a tool but too often , a lauded attribute. Arguments, yelling, language of guns and violence and retribution have become all too common in our national discourse. No wonder that unstable souls have come to see violence as a viable option in the midst of devolving discourse.

We Jews have been down this road before. Our sages teach that the destruction of the Great Temple in Jerusalem came about because of Sinat Hinam, senseless hatred. Too easily our ancestors fought with each other, and society crumbled. The lack of trust, lack of respect, lack of humanity resulted in destruction of all that we knew and held sacred.

We Jews, who are the inheritors of this legacy of destruction, have a role to play in the healing of America in 2011. We who are Rodfei Shalom, seekers of peace, must

at this time reach out to our neighbors, those with whom we agree and those with whom we disagree, and develop new bonds of trust, dignity, and respect.

Our nation needs our unique Jewish perspective, and I hope and pray that as a community we can reach out, one by one, and help in the healing of our country, relationship by relationship, interaction by interaction.

Hebrews in dance and song after the Egyptians drowned in the Red Sea, the angels began to rejoice as well, yet God rebuked His angels. The angels protested, "But look how your children Israel have triumphed." God responded, "The Egyptians are also my children." The *midrash* teaches us, "Let the Merciful One rebuke Satan." (*Kiddushin* 81b)

On the other hand, we are commanded, "Blot out the memory of Amalek from under the heaven!" (*Shemot* 17:14) Wherever evil resides, we must destroy it. The Torah teaches us to respect the life of every person as unique, because those who destroy even a single person have destroyed the image of God. "Whoever saves a single life, it is as though they have saved the entire world." (*Sanhedrin* 4:5)
