### Rabbi's Corner

While in Petoskey, I am reading David Grossman's novel *To the End of the Land*, about a woman called Ora trying to save the life of her son, Ofer the soldier, by avoiding

the notifiers who she fears will announce his falling in battle. Traveling through the Galilee with Ofer's broken-down, reclusive father, she tells him about his son he never met, and about her family life (she was married to Ilan, their former best friend). It is through this journey and Ora's narration that we discover the characters' history, and the impact of



war on their lives. It is a mesmerizing book. If you want to understand the geist, soul, and internal fears of Israel, I recommend reading Grossman's novel. I only regret that most of you would read the book in English, and thus lose the rich Hebrew of the original text.

The resemblance between the prose and the author's life is haunting. At the end of the book, a note informs readers that writing began in 2003—a half a year before Grossman's second son, Uri, was enlisted to the I.D.F. In 2006, Uri was killed during the last hours of the Second Lebanese War. The Grossmans were members of my congregation Kehilat Mevasseret Zion, and I Bar Mitzvah-ed Uri, his older brother, Yonathan, and his younger sister, Ruti. After Uri's death, I took part as a reform rabbi in his military funeral, which was a daring request on the part of the family: David was very critical of the Israeli Government for not stopping the war and for putting politics before people, and his speech at the rally before the end of the war resonated in many homes and hearts. Consequently, thousands of Israelis who had never met or known the family showed up at the funeral in silent support of the Grossmans.

Every year, when Menachem and I return to Petoskey, I think of ways to bring Israel closer to your hearts. It is a beautiful, successful country, but also a very intricate, multilayered one, difficult to understand in its fullness. As I read Grossman's novel, it occurred to me the best way to bring you close to Israel would be to simply recommend the book. To the Men's Book club, I suggest setting aside political analysis for once and instead delving into the Israeli soul through Grossman's fabulous book.

#### New Student Rabbi

Madeline Anderson, who will be joining Temple B'nai Israel this fall season, is a rising second year rabbinical student at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. During her year in Israel studies at H.U.C.-J.I.R. Jerusalem, she volunteered with Encounter Programs. Before rabbinical school, Madeline worked as the marketing and communications coordinator at Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation, and has spent two years working with Greater Indy Habitat for Humanity, one year serving on an AmeriCorps construction team, and another working on its administration team. In college, Madeline studied business at the University of Indianapolis, where she received a B.A. in Global Leadership and where, as a student, she helped develop the Precious Words Africa Project, which provides educational resources and infrastructure in Ghana. In addition, she has served on the Young Professionals Board at Jewish Federation of Greater Indianapolis, leading peers in various service projects, and has volunteered with Jewish Family Services, the Jewish Community Relations Council, and Greater Indy Habitat for Humanity. Madeline hopes that her passions for Jewish life, social justice, and leadership will guide her to build meaningful connections with the communities she serves.

#### **Intergenerational Retreat**

The L'Dor v'Dor Consortium has once again helped make possible the semi-annual Intergenerational Retreat, which will take place at the Clear Lake Education Center in Manistique on the weekend of August 24th.

The theme this year is "Putting the Pieces Together," encouraging participants to discuss their unique and varied journeys to and within Judaism, and resources will be available for interfaith families and individuals considering conversion. Marquette's student rabbi, Zoe McCoon, will be in attendance, providing rabbinical services and music. Guests will have chances to attend Shabbat and Havdalah services, go swimming and boating, and take a glass-bottomed raft across the Kitch-iti-kipi, Michigan's largest spring.

Thanks to a generous grant from the L'Dor v'Dor Women's Consortium and support from the Ravitz Foundation, the cost per person is only \$36 (includes on-site lodging, board, access to programming, and relevant materials). Comfort lodging is available off-site, in town.

## Rabbi House Project

Since 1925, Temple B'nai Israel has hosted student rabbis during the summer. In the 1990s, a year-round internship was established and, since 2014, Rav Maya Leibovich has served during the summer months.

Purchased in 1998 for sixty thousand dollars, the cur-

rent rabbi house has served our community well, but has begun to show both its limitations and, simply, its age—a sinking foundation, crumbling window casings, poor ventilation, outdated appliances—

leading to continually increasing maintenance bills.

To solve this costly issue, the temple is engaged in a fundraising campaign for the construction of a new rabbi house, which will improve our campus and help sustain our vibrant Jewish presence in Northern Michigan by providing safe, accessible housing for the rabbis this temple is so fortunate to attract each year. The proposal details a sustainably constructed three-bedroom, two-bath, fully conditioned 1,900-square-foot space, with appropriate furnishings and landscaping. 
