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Rabbi's Corner:

Saturday, January 16th was Rosh Chodesh Shevat, the first day of the month of Shevat. This month is best known for the holiday Tu B'Shevat. On the 15th of Shevat, we will celebrate the holiday, "New Year's Day" for the trees. It is a time when the winter starts to lose its grip over Israel, and Israelis venture out of their homes and plant trees to make the desert bloom. The first tree to bloom in Israel is always the almond tree. In Hebrew, the word for almond is `She-ked. A productive person is a Shek-`dan; they are the first ones to flee cabin fever and to get busy preparing for a bountiful harvest.

For a while, a forgotten holiday, in recent decades, Tu B'Shevat has once again regained a place for itself as a day for us to reflect upon our connection with the environment. We should be proud we cared for our environment long before Copenhagen. Deuteronomy 20:20 commands us, "When you wage war . . . you must not cut down the trees." Moreover, our holiest of books, the Torah, is referred to as Etz Chaim, the Tree of Life, "do not forsake it."

Tu B'Shevat's return to importance makes a significant statement about our values and our culture. While the time may not quite be right in northern Michigan to go out and start planting, we will gather as a community on January 3^{1st} to celebrate this important day with a traditional Tu B'Shevat Seder. We hope you will be a part of our gathering as we commemorate this special day for the health of our community, and that of our planet. May the coming year be a good year for the almond trees in Israel, a year for productivity.

This January we celebrated a Jewish holiday, Tu B'Shevat, and an American holiday, Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

As Jews we celebrate Tu B'Shevat, dubbed the Jewish Arbor Day. Even though Tu B'Shevat is considered a minor holiday on the Jewish calendar, today we are never more aware of its significance in an era of melting ice caps and the deforestation of our wilderness.
