Rabbi's Corner:

urim is here, so get out your masks and costumes and get ready to celebrate! Masks, it is said, hide our faces, but at the same time they uncover something about us. When our identity is concealed, the truth about our inner character is revealed. In addition to dressing up and celebrating the holiday – and triumph of justice over the evil Haman that Purim represents – there is also a tradition of assuring justice in our own



time. The Hebrew for "justice" – tzedek – shares the same root as tzedakah, which we usually associate with charity. Giving money and food to other people is an acknowledgement of their basic right to dignity, and so it is not considered a voluntary act in Judaism. It is an obligation of justice as much as catching a thief or stopping a murderer. However, it is different from other kinds of justice in an important way. Most justice is very public; there are hearings, testimony, and public records. However, charity is often private and anonymous. We have no way of knowing whether or not our neighbors have done their fair share in enforcing these laws of human dignity, and there is no one checking in on us to make sure that we give enough. A Purim tradition is to send gifts of food or money to family, friends, acquaintances, and the needy alike, which may or may

> not be done anonymously. There is a grand equality in this tradition, which encourages us to do justice even from behind a mask.
