

#### Rabbi's Corner:

hat is it about Challah? Just thinking about a fluffy, warm, slightly sweet loaf of that chewy, soft dough makes my mouth begin to water. For me, it just doesn't feel like Shabbat without it! What exactly makes Challah so special? Well, every loaf of Challah hearkens back to the time of Moses. It might come from the Manna that appeared each morning in the wilderness as our ancestors wandered for 40 years. On Friday mornings, a miraculous double-portion would appear so that



they would not have to gather food on Shabbat. For this reason, some people have the tradition of serving two loaves on Shabbat. It is also connected with the Temple sacrifices. Each Shabbat, twelve loaves were offered - one for each tribe. We often salt our Challah loaves, just as they did. The word "Challah" comes from the Hebrew word for "portion," referring to the portion of the dough that is taken from the risen dough and burned up completely. Why is it braided? Some say that it symbolizes the unity of Shabbat; all of the separate and fractured pieces of our lives are at peace. Some people braid six strands to symbolize the 6 days of the week leading up to Shabbat, or the twelve loaves of the ancient offering combined into two loaves. Still others have said that it was a popular style of 15th century Ukrainian baking that just stuck around. Of course, the most important thing is that it is delicious!


