Rabbi's Corner

There is a scene in the movie, "The Frisco Kid", where Avram, the young, bumbling, Polish rabbi played by Gene Wilder, is talking to a Native Americans, Chief Gray Cloud, played by Val Bisoglio.

The Chief asks Avram, "What does [your God] do?"

" He... He can do anything!" Avram replies.

"Then why can't he make rain?" asks Chief Gray Cloud. "Because he doesn't make rain. He gives us strength when we're suffering. He gives us compassion when all that we feel is hatred. He gives us courage when were searching around blindly like little mice in the darkness... but He does not make rain!"

Suddenly, there is crack of thunder and a downpour erupts. Avram shrugs, "Of course... sometimes, just like that, he'll change His mind."

The scene humorously illustrates the apparent capriciousness of God when it comes to the weather. Watching this scene following the High Holidays, I was reminded of a lightning storm that startled Jill, me, and the dog around 2am. The cold, wet, and windy week was dramatically different from the week of sun and beautiful weather that accompanied us last year at this time. The experience teaches us, try as we might to document and recognize patterns in the weather from year-to-year, God may just change his mind.

In spite of Avram's insistence that our God does not make rain, much of our religion has its roots in the changes of the seasons. Anthropologists of Judaism argue that Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur developed out of a need to purify ourselves of sin so that God would provide a bounty for the upcoming Sukkot Harvest.

The covers were designed and created by Mary Jean Meyerson. The large Torah cover is made in memory of Joan Chodak, from her many friends. The small Torah cover was made in honor of the Meyerson family and the back screen was made in honor of all the Temple women.

Mrs. Meyerson designed the covers and back drop to pull in the theme of the blue frame found on the windows and then added the sweet symbol of apples and honey for our delight. She wove the Torahs and the back drop together with a blue and silver Yad like band, made with some of the trim from the original covers. The beautiful white fabrics are quite unique as well. Mrs. Meyerson hunted throughout the fab-

ric shops of Chicago looking for the perfect white fabrics to help illuminate the Torahs. Her time was worth it, as the fabric truly does shine.

The Hebrew lettering at the top of the back screen states, "Let us enter your gates" and the bottom

Hebrew lettering states, "Remember us for life."

We will always be blessed with the memories of Joan Chodak and all the wonderful women of the Temple every year upon opening the ark during the High Holiday season.

Indeed, Sukkot represents the change from the hot, dry summer to the cold, rainy winter in Israel. The Lulav sounds like a crackling downpour when we shake it, may have originally have been the Jewish equivalent of a Native American rain dance. Although it may not be immediately apparent, when we perform Jewish rituals, we emphasize a deep connection to the natural world.

In the past two years, Petoskey has felt the capriciousness of the weather: An unusually cold year was followed by an unusually warm one. A dry and sunny High Holidays by a windy and stormy one. We hope rain or shine you will come out for our fall holiday celebrations these next two months!
